I Will Do It My Way: Your Story Matters

“There are different kinds of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are different kinds of service, but the same Lord. There are different kinds of working, but in all of them and in everyone it is the same God who works.” — 1 Corinthians 12:4-6 (NIV)



A Tapestry of Conversion

As a pastor, one of the greatest privileges is hearing the diverse stories of how people came to faith in Christ. I’ve heard of the dramatic moments—the person who stepped forward at a great crusade, the student whose life was utterly changed by a campus ministry message, or the one struck by truth after reading a single devotional book.

Then there are the quiet transformations—the individuals who can’t recall a single moment, having been raised in homes where faith was lived out daily, believing in Jesus as naturally as they learned to speak. Their faith developed gradually, a conscious, humble unfolding of Christ’s claims on their lives.

Your story, like every other, is unique. It’s a powerful, individual testimony woven into the fabric of the church. But when we look at this colorful tapestry of testimonies, a simple yet profound truth emerges: **There is no single formula for salvation.**

The Programmers Are Dismissed

If all conversions followed the same rigid steps—if everyone had to attend a certain event or follow a specific process—we, as humans, would inevitably try to program God. We would draw conclusions like, “If we do X, Y, and Z, conversions are guaranteed!” We would rely on our technique, our programs, and our energy.

But the Lord, in His sovereignty, constantly says, in effect, **“I am going to do it My way.”**

He purposefully uses an infinite variety of means to call His people. Why? So that we are **compelled to give Him the praise and the glory** for the conversion of every single person. Our hands are kept off the mechanism of grace so that His hand alone is visible. This keeps us humble, grateful, and entirely dependent on Him.

The Invisible Constant

Though the experiences are diverse, two non-negotiable constants remain at the core of every genuine conversion:

1. **The Message:** In every saving story, there is contact with the Gospel—the message of **Scripture alone** (*Sola Scriptura*). This message proclaims our condemnation (sin and death) set against our justification and life, which comes **only through Jesus Christ** (*Solus Christus*).
2. **The Power:** Deeper than the message is the hidden constant: the work of the **Holy Spirit**. We are saved by **grace alone** (*Sola Gratia*), and we receive this gift **only by faith** (*Sola Fide*). But where does the faith come from? It is the Holy Spirit who takes the external word of the Gospel, dispels the death and darkness in the heart, and creates the gift of faith that saves.

The Spirit is the source. The Spirit is the power. The Spirit is the invisible hand driving God's message home.

Reflection and Prayer

As you reflect on your own journey, take heart in this: Your conversion was not a fluke, a product of human technique, or a random chance. It was the sovereign work of God, who chose to do it *His way*—unprogrammed, unexpected, and undeniably powerful—so that He alone would receive the glory.

A Prayer for 2026

Sovereign Lord, thank you that my salvation is not dependent on my effort or on human programs, but entirely on your will and your grace. Thank you for the diversity of conversion stories, which remind us that you are working in countless ways. Most of all, thank you for the Holy Spirit, who took your living Word and created life and faith in my heart. Keep me humble and grateful and help me to always give you the praise and the glory.

Youth Ministry Update from Nancy Heise



YOUTH MINISTRY UPDATE:

Happy New Year! As we enter 2026, I am pleased to announce that Sunday school participation is improving with average attendance in December of 6 students a week. The Advent series was well received, each lesson

built on the previous week. I was also able to share the lessons with our Youth group Dec 10th and a great discussion followed.

In January, the Sunday School lessons will focus on how to read the Bible and get more out of the stories in preparation for the Bible milestone for third graders. If you have a 3rd, 4th, or 5th grader that has not received their Bible, please contact me so I know how many to order. These will be children's study Bibles aimed at 8-11 year olds. The study panels are written in easy to understand words. Every book of the Bible begins with a quick look at what you'll read about in that book. Themes, important moments of belief, and lessons are explained as well, with verses to help you locate them.

Our Confirmation and youth groups are also growing. In December, a group of high school students asked for a Bible study of their own. Keven Martini has graciously agreed to lead the 10th-12th graders. So far we have a group of 6-7 students involved. What a blessing to see this evolve.

The confirmation/youth students will be learning about Martin Luther and the reformation, the Holy Spirit, and the 6th and 7th commandments. I am impressed with some of the discussions we have had.

We also plan to attend Camp Shamineau, January 23-25. We are looking for at least one male chaperone. Please let me know if you are interested.

It is good for us to model Bible study and prayer for our children/grandchildren. Here are a few ways to pray for biblical virtues.

Growth in Grace. "I pray that my children may grow in the grace and knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 3:18).

Love. "Grant, Lord, that my children may learn to live a life of love, through the Spirit who dwells in them" (Galatians 5:25, Ephesians 5:2).

Self-control. "Father, help my children not be like many others around them, but let them be alert and self-controlled in all they do" (1 Thessalonians 5:6).

A Word from Your Council Pres

It's mid-December, when I'm writing a brief update on some happenings I foresee coming in the next couple of months.

Immanuel is in a unique position, ready to engage in this rare opportunity of interim transition, and I want to make certain that we all realize now is our time to shine!

After a quarter century of having the same Pastor, we are ready to tackle the necessary work of our interim period. It's a time for self-study, setting new goals and gaining new perspectives to ensure a healthy future for Immanuel.

I realize it's been six months since Pastor Paul retired, and some of us have been anxious for action, but I'm reminded that the calendar moves significantly faster than most of us. In addition, we know God has plans, and we pray and look for His guidance and direction, without undue self-driven hurriedness.

I see 2026 as a tremendous opportunity for us to embrace who we are, in the here and now, and to work systematically together to develop a vision for tomorrow's Immanuel. If we handle our transition successfully, we will have laid the groundwork and established a good base and understanding of the kind of Pastoral leadership we might attract and need for a successful future.

At this writing, we are just beginning to seek strong key individual congregation leaders who can help guide us through the transition process. We are developing a Transition Team to guide us in 2026. Note, there are three anticipated council positions open in February, as well. Listen for your tap on the shoulder. Is God calling you to serve? What talents can you bring to Immanuel's needs today?

Pastor Ian is providing our Pastoral ministry needs during this transition time and is currently encouraging our review of organizational and governance structure. Expect minor Constitution and governance document changes to come before the congregation in January in preparation for the February Annual Meeting.

Whether you are a snowbird or a die-hard year-round Immanuelite, your continued participation in the congregation is important. We will utilize electronic means, whenever possible, to keep everyone connected, no matter where you are. In other words, Stay tuned, Stay connected. **We Need You!**



Residents Encounter Christ

REC

Residents Encounter Christ is a two-day spiritual encounter in the jails and prisons. It is based on the Teens Encounter Christ, a 3-day program. REC is typically done on a Saturday and Sunday, starting around 7AM and wrapped up around 8 PM. In the jail, the 3-day program is condensed to fit the 2-day weekend.

Weekends are currently held twice a year at the Aitkin County and Crow Wing County Jails, usually in spring and fall. There are typically about 20 volunteers who participate in a REC weekend from the “outside.” The number of jail residents, called recites (rek-ites), varies but all who participate have to sign up and be approved by the jail administration. Also, as an offshoot of the REC program is one called “”Let’s Talk” held on Wednesday evenings. This is where several volunteers from REC go into the jails on a Wednesday evening to lead weekly Bible studies and talk/listen/share sessions with jail residents who have signed up for the evening sessions.

Dave Peterson says, “I became active after Rich Aulie told me about the program and later Larry Hartman asked me if I’d be interested in working a weekend. At first it seemed the jail weekends conflicted with Via de Cristo weekends or practices but in 2009 a weekend was held where there was no conflict so that was the first weekend I could help. I didn’t know what to expect but after I experienced a weekend REC, I saw the value in the program and have continued ever since when I can. Rich Aulie has been active since about 2004, not long after he and I had gone through the Via de Cristo as weekenders.”

In November a Meal with a Mission was held for supplies. Items to purchase are Bibles, crosses, coffee, tagboard, pencils, markers, etc. Occasionally replacing mics and mic cords or other supplies for the sound system.

I credited our Heavenly Father for His grace. It was a miracle, especially since Jim rarely finds anything he is looking for. There was a second marvel in this discovery. The voucher stated the date due as January 15th. Whew! What a feeling of relief.

DISCUSSION OF COUNCIL MINUTES for October 19, 2025

FINANCIAL REPORT

Discussion

Acceptance: Peter Nordell moved the Financial Report be accepted. Tom Nixon seconded his motion, and the motion was approved by voice vote.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. Buildings and Grounds: Committee secured snow removal contract with Majestic Creations. The members of this committee also cleaned out the rain gardens on the north and south of the church.
2. Personnel/Budget/Finance: Pastor Ian moved we accept the Finance Committee's 2026 Employee wage proposal with recommended changes to include seeking a Music Coordinator to be paid up to \$32 per hour, rather than \$20 per hour and remove the dollar figure for the Tech

Support Coordinator for 2026. Peter Nordell seconded his motion. The motion was approved by a voice vote.

3. Other recommendations: The Finance Committee recommended closing and liquidation of Account #1420 – Cetera Stock Portfolio and asked that the balance be applied to the Kehl House debt. Peter Nordell moved to accept Committee's recommendation; Debbie Lindahl seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Audio/Visual Equipment Upgrade: David Pundt reported that equipment has been ordered and work could begin after Christmas. Training in the new equipment is part of the contract.
2. Plan-Governance Document Review: Tom Nixon reported that corrections and updates could be made at one more workshop to be held in January in time for Congregation notification for approval at the Annual Meeting.
3. Council Vacancies: There will be three vacancies on the Council to be filled at the Annual Meeting.
4. Kehl Property recommendation: Council agreed that we need more information and perhaps a prepared lease agreement for review.
5. Worship Service Schedule Changes: Consensus was to form a Worship Committee
6. New Member Procedure: Council will contact potential members to gauge membership interest. It was recommended that we prepare a new member information form for the process. Procedure in the By-Laws will be updated in January.

NEW BUSINESS

1. Interim Process: Council determined to invite outside volunteers who have experience in the development of an interim transition team for their advice at the January meeting.
2. Budget Committee Recommendation: Council agreed to not pursue a contract with Cost Reduction Consultants, LLC
3. Facility Use Policy: Tabled
4. Welcome Brian Marquart: Peter Nordell moved and Pastor Ian seconded a motion to welcome Brian Marquart to the Council to fill a vacant position. The motion was passed unanimously by voice vote.

- b. Char Kinzer made a motion that if the house was not rented by the time spring taxes are due, taxes would be taken from the account 'Area of Greatest need'. Debbie Lindahl seconded the motion, and it was approved.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Immanuel Forward project – update:

- a. A draft lease has been prepared, and the earliest we could be ready to rent might be February.
- b. Randy Stanfield replaced three windows with the help of Amy to allow for egress and safety compliance.

- c. George Erickson has volunteered to paint two bedrooms.
- 2. Set date for Governance documents and structure council retreat: The Council will meet on Saturday, January 10, to prepare documents for congregation review before the annual meeting.
- 3. Immanuel Interim Transition Team Plan: A couple of members have volunteered to be on the Interim Transition Team. Council members will think of others to serve with a January goal of starting the process.

NEW BUSINESS

- 1. Facility Use Policy: Peter Nordell moved that the Facility Use Policy be approved with noted edits. Pastor Ian seconded his motion, and it was approved by a voice vote.
- 2. New Member Recognition December 21 – note Council approval of receiving new members.
- 3. Pastor Ian made a motion to receive into membership at Immanuel Lutheran Church of Crosby, the following persons: Randall & Geraldine Cronk and Mikah, Harry & Susanne Heckart, Ron & Nancy Meyer, Gail Mueller, Leif & Melissa Gustafson, and Brian & Jackie Wood with Colton, Addison, Carly. David Pundt seconded the motion, and the motion passed.
 - a. Brian Marquart will announce new members' names at the service on December 21 and welcome them into full Immanuel Lutheran Church membership.
- 4. Transfer of membership for Adrian & Jean Olson: Peter Nordell moved that we honor the request for Adrian and Jean Olson to transfer their membership to Howard Lake. Brian Marquart seconded his motion, and it was approved by a voice vote. Council Secretary David Pundt signed the official transfer form.
- 5. Christmas Eve Services: No action.
- 6. December 28 service – Lessons & Carols: It was decided that we would have a special “Lessons & Carols” service instead of a regular service on Sunday, December 28. Mark Carlson has offered to lead that service.
