If you're looking for a worthwhile read during these cold winter nights, I highly recommend **Becoming God's Family** by **Carmen Joy Imes**. Whether you read it for personal reflection or as part of a group Bible Study, this book offers profound insights. While it can be a challenging read at times, discussing it together provides a wonderful

opportunity to clarify thoughts and build closer relationships. There are questions at the end of each chapter that are not specific to an interim process so a series of relevant questions that are focused on our needs can be picked up, along with the book, at the church office. Reading this book will provide encouragement during the interim process, as it directly addresses the theological and relational hurdles churches face during seasons of transition

Reasons for Reading This Book

1. Stabilizes Identity in times of Transition

An interim period is often marked by identity confusion, grief over the past minister, and anxiety about the future. This book counters that instability by providing a stable, biblical foundation. It shifts the congregation's focus from **who is leaving or arriving** to **who they are in Christ**—a family defined by God's covenant, not by human leadership. This promotes **stabilization** and grounds the church in eternal truths.

2. Promotes Unity and Heals Dysfunction

The book's unflinching look at Israel's failures (dysfunction, exile, family drama) gives the congregation a theological framework to process its own **past hurts, conflicts, or necessary changes** without shame. By emphasizing **covenant love, forgiveness, and reconciliation** (Chapters 7 & 8), it prepares the congregation to present a **unified and healed body** to the incoming minister, fulfilling a primary goal of the interim process.

3. Creates Objective Criteria for the Call

The book is structured around ten key theological concepts (covenant, grace, mission, presence, commitment). By studying these themes, the congregation collectively develops **a shared vocabulary and clear vision** of the biblical church. This translates directly into **objective criteria** for self-evaluation and discernment ensuring they choose a minister whose theology and philosophy align with the church's core identity, rather than just subjective personal preference.

4. Empowers Lay Leadership

The book stresses that the Church is the **Body of Christ** and the **New Temple** where God's presence dwells in **all** members (Chapter 6). This directly challenges the common "**pastor-as-performer/CEO**" model. It validates the gifts and responsibilities of the laity, equipping

the congregation to be **active participants** in ministry. This ensures the next pastor inherits a **committed, engaged, and ready-to-serve** church, reducing dependency on a single figure.



Youth Ministry Update from Nancy Heise



Time is flying as we prepare to celebrate Lent. We are looking for adults to act as Faith mentors with our confirmation students. Each student and faith mentor pair will meet following Lenten worship and review some discussion questions. This is a great opportunity to build connections between the generations within our congregation.

In January, I met with 8 students and their families and led a class in beginning bible exploration. Each of the students will be presented with a NIV Action Bible on February 1st during the church service. These bibles are written in easy-to-understand words. Study panels help clarify the text in terms the students are more familiar with to build understanding. The bibles have great graphics, maps, and anecdotes about the context of the passage and how it would have been viewed at the time it was written.

The Sunday school lessons are currently following Truewaykids.com lessons focused in January on Jesus presentation at the temple, childhood, baptism and start of his ministry. All children ages 4-11 are welcome to join us for a lesson following communion. February lessons are the temptation of Jesus and continuing his early ministry and choosing the Apostles.

In confirmation, we have completed the first 7 commandments and are working on memorizing them. A group of students attended Camp Shamineau January 23-25th with time spent worshiping and enjoying a variety of crafts and the great outdoors.

The senior high bible study is continuing to meet weekly on Wednesday evenings in the fireside room. Thanks to Kevin Martini for leading this group.

Some more ways to model bible study and pray for our children and grandchildren are:

Perseverance. "Lord, teach my children perseverance in all they do, and help them especially to run with perseverance the race marked out for them" (Hebrews 12:1).

Responsibility. "Grant that my children may learn responsibility, for each one should carry his own load" (Gal. 6:5).

Gratitude. "Help my children to live lives that are always overflowing with thankfulness and always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Eph. 5:20, Col. 2:7).

Writing an article for the future month's newsletter is always a challenge, as it bears witness to things in January that may seem long past to a February reader.

One can only hope that's true for this first topic. At the time of this writing (January 18), those of us in the pews and people watching the service online are painfully aware of the audio glitches that continue to disrupt a smooth church service, and some are no doubt wondering when that will be a thing of the past. None, however, are more frustrated and affected than our dedicated volunteers upstairs in the loft, who cross their fingers every week, hoping for a no-stress technical hour during worship.

There's hope! The council authorized an extensive revamp of the aging audio/visual system a couple of months ago. New equipment is currently being installed and tested. Soundboard training will soon follow.

This is your cue. Tired of just sitting in the pew Sunday after Sunday? Could you help one weekend a month? New equipment is lauded as 'easy to operate'. We would really like to see some additional volunteers to help run the sound and audio, so we don't burn out the people we have.

The Annual meeting is right around the corner. Please attend the Annual Financial Meeting on February 8 and the Annual Meeting on February 15. We'll vote on the 2026 budget, install new council members, and help clean up some governance documents. The Council has reviewed the Constitution and Bylaws and is proposing four amendments that are merely housekeeping in nature. As for our Interim path forward - It's a new year! I feel we are ready for a deliberate path forward, and I'm confident we can use the excuse of a new year as a launch pad.

Pastor Ian has a Pastoral ministry plan in mind. The congregation is ready for a renewed season to position Immanuel for our new chapter. Perhaps we can start by gathering some history, an overview of where we've been, to help guide where we'd like to be. What milestones can we recall and record? I'm looking forward to 'The Immanuel Story' that long-time members can pull together.

OPENING PRAYER

Pastor Ian offered the opening prayer.

CALL TO ORDER

Char Kinzer called the meeting to order at 5:35 p.m.

Addition(s) to Agenda: Old Business #5 Sound System Update; New Business #3: Authorize Norm Hullinger transfer, #4 Home School approval.

Agenda Acceptance: Paula Traylor moved the agenda, as amended be approved. Peter Nordell seconded his motion, and it was approved on a voice vote.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Acceptance: Peter Nordell moved that the Financial Report be accepted. Tom Nixon seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Finance

1. 2026 Budget Approval: Brian Marquart moved that we approve the 2026 Budget, Tom Nixon seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.
2. 2026 Benevolence Approval: Tom Nixon moved to change proposed donations for Lutheran Social Services to \$500 and change Bridges of Hope donations to \$2400 for 2026. Brian Marquart seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote. Tom Nixon moved that we approve the 2026 Benevolence Account as amended. Brian Marquart seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.
3. Council was apprised of Executive Committee action that moved the matured Elsie Anderson Memorial CD to a Unity Bank 9-month CD at 3.85%. Information only.

Building and Grounds:

- Parsonage: A sewer line freeze-up at the beginning of the year, caused backup in the parsonage basement. Insurance has been contacted and all repairs are underway. ServiceMaster will be removing carpet and providing clean-up and asbestos mitigation will take place if necessary. Jim Patrick has offered to be the contractor on any rebuild needed. The septic line was steamed out.
- Handicap signs: A number of handicapped parking signs will be added in the spring to accompany the painted markings, which get covered by snow.

OLD BUSINESS

1. Immanuel Forward update: Informational only.

2. Immanuel East rental: Brian Marquart moved that we rent Immanuel East at market rates. Char Kinzer seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote. David Pundt moved we form a committee consisting of Jim Traylor, Harry Kahnert, and Leif Gustafson to prepare a lease agreement and tenant requirements for Council approval at February's meeting. Paula Traylor seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.
3. Organizational structure/council retreat: Postponed indefinitely.
4. Audit Review 2026: An audit review was not completed in 2025. Peter Nordell moved that we ensure an Audit Review will be completed by the end of 2026. Paula Traylor seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.
5. Sound System Update: David Pundt reported that the new digital mixer and 75" color monitor has been installed, and training will be accomplished intermittently, beginning next Sunday, January 25th. Contractor Jody Stewart was told of a potentially faulty amplifier, which seems to shut down unexpectedly. Sound system work is nearly complete.
