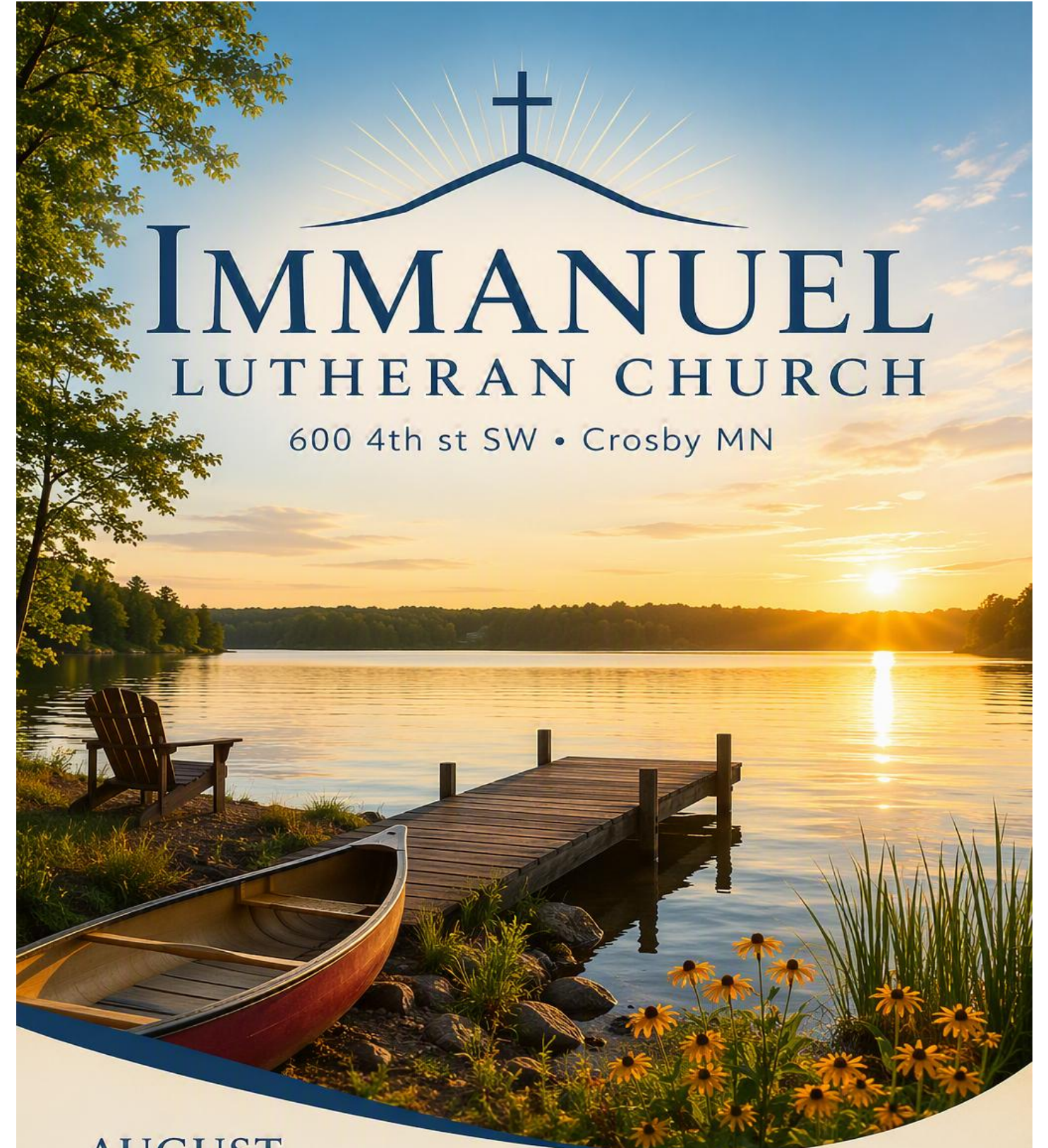

The Vision That Sustains Us



There can be no question about the beautiful, bittersweet reality of this moment: Stephen, the church's first martyr, saw the risen and ascended Jesus standing in glory at the right hand of God the Father. To be a martyr simply means to be a witness—someone whose life so radiates the truth of Christ that they are willing to hold fast to it, even at the cost of their very breath. And so, it was for Stephen.

Yet, that breathtaking glimpse into the heavens was not the first time Stephen had seen his Savior. Long before the skies parted, Stephen had been gazing intimately at Jesus through the pages of the Old Testament. As he read the ancient stories of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob, his heart saw Christ. When he meditated on God's dramatic deliverance of His people from Egypt and their journey into the Promised Land, he recognized the hand of the Redeemer. Through the songs of the psalmists and the urgent cries of the prophets, Stephen heard the unmistakable voice of Jesus speaking to His church.

When Stephen was hauled before the Sanhedrin, facing heavy and hostile charges of blasphemy, he didn't shrink back. Instead, out of a deep well of love and pastoral concern, he opened up the Old Testament for his accusers. He gently but boldly tried to pull back the veil so that they, too, might see and hear the very Jesus they were blindly persecuting.

It was this deep, enduring vision of Jesus in the Scriptures that gave Stephen the supernatural courage to stand firm in that courtroom. He knew exactly where the trial would lead, yet he was sustained by a deeper truth.

His steadfast faithfulness was met with an extraordinary gift of grace: as he looked up from the hostility of the world, his spiritual sight became a literal reality. Heaven opened, and he saw the Son of God standing at the right hand of His Father, as if rising to welcome His weary servant home.

From a human perspective, we might be tempted to look at this scene and think the early church could ill afford to lose a leader and witness of Stephen's caliber. It feels like a tragedy. But in the economy of God's grace, Stephen had drawn so close to the heart of heaven that stepping across the threshold to be with Jesus was only a short, gentle step.

His suffering and physical death were not a failure of his faith, nor were they a failure of God's protective care. They are a profound reminder that God weaves even our deepest pain into a tapestry that brings glory to Himself, ultimately drawing each of us home to His eternal glory.

A Prayer for the Journey

Father, open our eyes today that we, too, might see the glimpses of glory You have woven into our lives and Scripture. Open our ears to truly hear Your truth above the noise of the world and soften our hearts to receive Jesus freshly as our Savior, our Guide, and our Lord. **Amen.**

Change is in the air as fall approaches!

First, a heartfelt thank you to Jim and Paula Traylor for opening their home to the youth on July 22nd. We enjoyed an afternoon of food, games, boating, and tubing. It was a lovely afternoon.

Following several discussions with Pastor Ian and the church council, we have decided to change how confirmation is offered at Immanuel Lutheran. There are only 2 students who will not be confirmed this fall.

The 10th-grade students who have been active in confirmation over the past few years will attend several required lessons in September and October, complete their faith statements, and be confirmed on October 25th.

The younger confirmation students will be offered a zoom confirmation program thru our connection to the NALC (North American Lutheran Church). This program is 2 years long and led by Pastor Teresa Peters, Director of Youth and Family Ministry. This program requires both the parent and child to register for the program and accept the requirements.

There is an academic component that meets on Thursday evenings from 7-815 pm on zoom. This is interactive, not just passive and requires 75% attendance. Year one covers prayer, Old Testament, and New Testament. Year two covers Luther's Small Catechism and writing a faith statement.

The service portion of the program requires students to participate in their local congregation in some manner two times a month. This could be usher, greet, read, help with technology, help with meals with a mission or the bazaar, etc.

Each student will also need a mentor from the congregation. The student and mentor will meet monthly to discuss questions related to the past months' learning.

Year one covers prayer, the Old Testament and the New Testament. Year two is primarily covering the small catechism and writing faith statements.

Each student will need a mentor from our congregation. The student and mentor will meet monthly and review questions provided by the NALC. This meeting is expected to be an hour. We will need 2-4 mentors depending on how many students sign up.

Each student is also expected to participate in service to the congregation 2 times a month. This may be reading, ushering, helping with meal with a mission, helping grounds teams, or



with congregation supported missions such as Malawi or the fall bazaar. Students could also learn about the tech team and serve in this way.

I am resigning as youth coordinator due to family commitments.

How can you help?

Immanuel is looking for someone to commit 4-5 hours a week to guiding the current confirmation students through the baptism and communion lessons in the Luther House of Study program. This person will also help with organizing confirmation. I can answer any questions.

Immanuel also needs someone to monitor the confirmation program for the younger students. This person would be a contact point between the NALC program and our congregation.

COMING SOON: The ILC Congregational Survey!

Your ILC Transitional Steering Committee has been working hard *and* quickly during the past month to generate one of the important steps in our pathway to call a new pastor: The ILC Congregational Survey. This survey is intended to define who the congregation is and where God is leading us. The information will provide valuable insights that will guide our call process as well as provide candidates an important overview of our congregation and the priorities we have for our future spiritual and physical growth.

To serve the call process as efficiently as we can, we've decided to pursue a tight timeline. We will first distribute the history of our congregation, compiled this past spring by the Transition Profile Team. It was made available on July 26. The next Sunday, August 2, we will announce the initiation of our survey at church and make it available online using Survey Monkey and in the back of the church. Paper surveys also can be requested by calling the church office. All paper surveys can be returned to a locked drop box in the narthex of the church. Everyone will have three weeks to complete it. Be assured that all responses will be handled anonymously.

Once the survey is completed and the results have been tabulated, we will be hosting open group meetings for further discussion to ensure that we capture as many insights from the congregation as possible. Our committee then will distribute a document to the congregation that summarizes the responses to the survey. *Everyone's participation is extremely important!*

Call to Order: Council President Char Kinzer called the meeting to order at 10:55 a.m.

Declaration of a Quorum: Char Kinzer announced that there were 106 Immanuel Lutheran members present. (57 was required)

Acceptance of the Agenda: Carol Pundt moved that the agenda be accepted without change. George Erickson seconded the motion and it was approved by voice vote.

Opening Prayer: The meeting was opened with a community prayer.

Congregation Business Presentation: The presenters identified the pros and cons of buying the .6 acre lot adjacent to the Immanuel parking lot.

Motion: Nancy Evans moved that we approve the purchase of the St. Joseph ballfield for \$90,000 plus closing costs, pursuant to the details of the Letters of Intent. David Pundt seconded the motion and it was approved by paper ballot, 104 yes, 2 no.

Closing Prayer: The meeting concluded with a community prayer.

Adjournment: Carol Pundt moved that the meeting be adjourned at 11:28 a.m. Nancy Evans seconded the motion and it was approved by voice vote.

Congregation Approves Purchase of St. Joseph's Vacant Ballfield Lot

At a Special Congregation meeting held on Sunday, July 12, members voted overwhelmingly to purchase the vacant 'ballfield' lot to the south of our parking lot. Of the 106 voting members in attendance, 104 voted yes and two voted against purchasing the lot.

An Immanuel Forward Property Committee of ten Immanuel Lutheran Church (ILC) members had been working together since mid-May, when Father Eli, from St. Joseph Church, reached out to ILC, offering a first option to buy the lot. The committee put together an informative presentation and purchase proposal, which was presented at the Special Congregation Meeting.

The proposal included a plan to utilize a special 5.65% second mortgage loan, using equity in the rental property we own, for approximately \$75,000 to pay for the \$90,000 lot plus closing costs. The remaining gap, of approximately \$19,000, would be covered by using \$10,000 from our Fidelity Memorial Investment Account and a generous anonymous \$10,000 private donation.

That financial proposal would simply expand the first mortgage and allow the new lot to be owned free and clear.

The congregation has shown strong support by quickly paying down the mortgage on the Don Kehl property we purchased last fall. That same continued support and rent will adequately cover the financial needs of the rental house and the newly purchased property.

The closing for the property will happen on, or close to, August 31, 2026.

Corner 6th Ave SW Garden Lot Sells, Helps Reduce the Rental Property Mortgage

We have sold the corner lot (previous garden plot at 6th Ave SW across the street from our church parking lot. The closing on July 31 is expected to net approximately \$7,600 after closing costs, which will be applied as a principal-only payment on the Immanuel East rental property mortgage. As this is being written, before the \$7,600 payment is applied, the balance owed on the \$185,000 property purchased last fall is a little over \$70,000. The equity in this property has allowed us to take a second mortgage to purchase the Catholic Church ballfield. The ballfield will be owned free and clear.

OPENING PRAYER: Char Kinzer led our opening prayer.

CALL TO ORDER: President Char Kinzer called the meeting to order at 5:32 pm.

Addition(s) to Agenda/Agenda Acceptance: New Business #6 Authorization to sign land sale documents for 6th Ave SW corner lot closing set for July 31, 2026; New Business #7 Review Special Congregational

Meeting Minutes. George Erickson moved the agenda be approved as amended; Paula Traylor seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.

JOYS OF IMMANUEL: A wonderful Special Congregational Meeting and fantastic turnout; a great presentation by the Immanuel Forward Property Committee and representatives on the potential purchase of St. Joseph's ball field; the overwhelming congregational approval to purchase; \$3,700 raised at a meal with a mission for the Hendrickson's; the ongoing membership class with two new members and their three young children.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

Discussion/Acceptance: Paula Traylor moved that we accept the Financial Report. Debbie Lindahl seconded her motion, and it was approved by voice vote.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Finance and Investment:

Motion to approve authorized signer for St. Joseph vacant lot purchase: George Erickson moved that Char Kinzer be authorized to sign all papers related to the purchase of the St. Joseph lot. Mary Ellen Perry seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.

Motion to approve \$10,000 toward St. Joseph Vacant Lot Purchase: George Erickson moved that the Immanuel Forward Property Committee be allowed to use \$10,000 from the Fidelity memorial account for the survey, closing and purchase of the St. Joseph lot. Meredith Bloedel seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.

Buildings and Grounds: Wade Burlet reported that the committee will install a new mailbox on Church property to receive mail Monday through Thursday. The Post Office will hold Friday and Saturday mail. Wade reported that the new grass at the parsonage is ready to grow without daily watering. One member of the committee is looking into purchasing a Ring Camera for church security.

Transition Steering Team: Paula Traylor moved that the Transition Steering Team be authorized to use \$200 from the Transition Fund special savings account to buy two months of Survey Monkey professional version. Wade Burlet seconded her motion, and it was approved by voice vote.

Debbie Lindahl moved that the Transition Steering Team be authorized to use up to \$70 to buy a locking drop box for confidential survey responses. George Erickson seconded her motion, and it was approved by a voice vote.

PASTOR'S REPORT: Pastor Ian reported that he will be going on vacation between August 3, 2026, and August 17, 2026. He has arranged for the Gideon's Bible organization to make their annual speech to the congregation. Membership classes have been going well. He reported that he'd received written questions for the pastoral search committee from Men's Den. Questions from a committee representing congregation members who attended a series of sessions on Lutheran theology and practice will be presented next week.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

1. **Confirmation Youth Needs:** George Erickson moved that a Confirmation Coordinator be hired at \$20/hour for 4 or 5 hours a week, or volunteer sought, for the seven Confirmation students preparing for their Confirmation this fall. The coordinator will need to meet with students three or four times in September and October to teach the Luther House of Study sacrament lessons, organize meals those nights, and be in contact with confirmands. Mary Ellen Perry seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.

A volunteer will be sought to be the liaison with youth and NALC to guide the remaining two or more 6th and 7th-grade youth through a new September 17 NALC two-year on-line confirmation program to track service hours and mentors for approximately 2 hours/week.

2. **Church Security Policy:** Brian Marquart and David Pundt volunteered to examine available resources to develop a Security Policy and procedures document and report back for direction.

NEW BUSINESS

1. **Bea Anderson Scholarship:** Char Kinzer moved that we award a \$500 Bea Anderson Scholarship to Isaiah Aulie. George Erickson seconded her motion, and it was approved by voice vote.
2. **Part-time Maintenance Position:** Char Kinzer moved to temporarily hire Wade Burlet to do light maintenance at the Church and Parsonage for up to 32 hours a month as needed at \$20/hour. An unused Office Support Account #7150 and unused amounts from an unused account #7230 Music coordinator account would be used to financially support a revived #7225 Maintenance Account temporarily to be reviewed for the next fiscal year budget. Meredith Bloedel seconded her motion, and it was approved by voice vote.
3. **Right Path Ministry:** Debbie Lindahl moved that the Right Path Ministry be discontinued for lack of use. Brian Marquart seconded her motion, and it was approved by a voice vote.
4. **Land purchase closing:** George Erickson moved Immanuel Forward be authorized to use \$1,000 from an Anonymous Donation to pay to Coldwell Banker Crown Realtors as Earnest money for the St. Joseph land purchase. Debbie Lindahl seconded his motion, and it was approved by voice vote.
5. **Parsonage Value Update:** Discussion ensued to direct Deb Eatros to discuss updating the market valuation of the Parsonage with the tax accountant and send insurance documents to George Erickson for review.
6. **Authorize signer for 6th Ave SW land sale for corner lot at Cygneture Title:** Mary Ellen Perry moved that Char Kinzer be authorized to sign all papers related to the sale of the Sixth Avenue Corner lot. Paula Traylor seconded her motion, and it was approved by voice vote.
7. **Special Congregation Meeting minutes:** Council reviewed July 12, Special Congregation Meeting minutes finding no discrepancies.

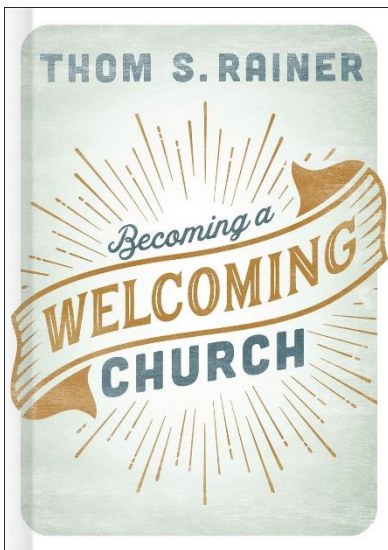

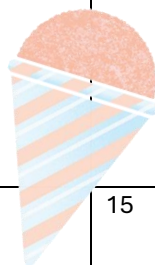
ADJOURNMENT: Brian Marquart moved we adjourn at 7:03 pm. His motion was seconded by Debbie Lindahl.
